

How this book stands out: Eleven-year-old Kemi, fascinated by science, confronts a seismic threat when asteroid Amplus-68 endangers Earth. In an unwelcoming new town, she creates a timecapsule to preserve her family's essence. Eventually, she must facethe hardest part of life: saying goodbye.



A Seed in the Sun by Aida Salazar

A First Time for Everything by Dan Santat

How this book stands out: This middle-grade graphic memoir is the story of Dan finding his self-confidence, falling in love, and finding himself all against the backdrop of a European tour with his peers. **You might also like:** *El Deafo, Button Pusher, One Last Shot*



The Labors of Hercules Beal by Gary D. Schmidt

How this book stands out: Herc Beal tackles a school assignment to replicate the legendary Twelve Labors of Hercules. With the help of new friends, Herc discovers that he doesn't have to face challenges alone and makes new discoveries along the way.

How this book stands out: Told in the perspective of a rover named Resilience, we get a glimpse at how human emotions and struggles are not always exclusive to the living.

How this book stands out: The question of whether a small town should change their Native American mascot is explored in this novel in verse. Each of the six middle school students who have been assigned to debate the hot topic learn new things about themselves and their community.

Stateless by Elizabeth Wein

How this book stands out: Set in 1937, amidst the rise of the Nazi party, Stella North is the lone female competitor representing Britain in the first air race. The friendly competition quickly turns as there is direct sabotage, making Stella question who she can trust among the other racers.
