Grade Level Goals:

Students who complete this course successfully will be able to:

- 1. Represent word problems involving addition and subtraction of whole numbers up to 20.
- 2. Use objects, pictures, and expanded and standard forms to represent numbers up to 120.
- 3. Self-select texts on grade level (instructional level J) and interact with those texts independently for increasing periods of time.
- 4. The student uses the writing process recursively (plan, draft, revise, edit, and publish) to compose multiple texts that are legible and uses grade-appropriate conventions.

Student Evaluation:

The grading system for grade level (K-1) is as follows:

- Standards based report card, based on mastery of standards (TEKS) assessed/observed by teacher
- Students will get feedback on report care in the core content areas of Math, ELAR, Science, and Social Studies. The reporting categories are as follows:

Assignments, exams, expectations outside of the classroom:

- Students will be assessed in reading and math with district beginning of year, middle of year and end of year
 assessments. These results will be reported to parents and discussed with students in order to create goals for
 academic progress.
- Student exams will be administered in whole group or small group setting when needed during a unit to show mastery of a topic.
- Students will need to read at home with an adult every evening.

Classroom Expectations:
