### **Course Description:**

### Pre-AP Texas History 7

Designed to meet the needs of the district's more advanced students, this course is designed to help students develop an understanding and appreciation of the history and geography of Texas as well as the state's cultural heritage from early times to the present. Students will read and interpret primary and secondary source documents, sharpen writing and research skills and/or to develop creative projects for historical periods covered. This course assists in preparing students for the challenges offered by the Advanced Placement program through sustained habits necessary for success in the College Board's AP Program.

### **Course Goals:**

Students who complete this course successfully will be able to:

• Understand traditional historical points of reference in Texas History.

• Understand how individuals, events and issues have helped shape the history of Texas from the independence from Spain to early statehood.

- To use geographic tools to collect, analyze and interpret data.
- Understand the location and characteristics of places and regions of Texas.
- Understand the effects of the interaction between humans and the environment in Texas during the 19th, 20th, and 21st centuries.
- Understands the basic principles reflected in the Texas Constitution
- Understand the importance of the expression of different points of view in a democratic society.

# **Student Evaluation:**

The grading system for this course is as follows:

- Grade averaged 60% Major 40% Minor (Advanced courses 70% Major 30% Minor)
- Major grades tests (including District Common Assessments, six weeks assessments, projects, final essays, research papers, presentations); minimum three per six weeks
- Minor grades quizzes, daily assignments, journals; minimum 4 per six weeks

- Semester exams will count 1/7 of the semester grade
- A letter system (S, N, U) is used to report a student's conduct based on proper/responsive conduct and citizenship 2
- Per Board Policy EIA (LOCAL), "The District shall permit a student who meets the criteria detailed in the grading guidelines a reasonable opportunity to redo an assignment or retake a test for which the student received a failing grade. This policy applies only to initial identified major grades and does not apply to daily assignments, quizzes, sixweek test, and semester final examinations. Upon reteach and retest, the new test, project, etc. recorded will be a high score of 70%.

Official grades will be in Skyward only and can be accessed by student and parent through Family Access.

### Assignments, exams, expectations outside of the classroom:

Assignments not completed during class time may have to be completed at home and turned in on the assigned date. I will check spirals at the end of each week. Students may be required to gather material for projects or to research events that we are studying in class. Students may also be required to finish or complete projects at home. This will be announced on canvas and in the classroom. Students should make time to study for tests and quizzes.

### Attendance/Tardy Policy/Make-Up Work:

Students that are absent will have one day for every day absent to complete an assignment that was assigned on that day (for example, if your student is absent on Monday and I assigned something, they would get the missing assignment on Tuesday and need to turn it in on Wednesday). Students are responsible for find out what assignment they missed and getting a copy of it. I have a crate that will have copies of all our assignments in it. Most of our assignments will be due by the end of class; however, all assignments will need to be turned in by Friday of each week to make sure grades get are entered in Skyward. I update grades at least once a week, usually on Friday. Quizzes that have a grade below 70% may be corrected and have a parent's signature for a raise in grade. Retests will be scheduled during tutoring hours.

### **Classroom Expectations:**

I have high expectations for my students. I expect them to be Prompt, Prepared, and Polite. They will be on time to class and will turn in assignments on time. They will be prepared with the material needed for class, be prepared to be engaged, to participate, and to learn. They will be polite and encouraging to others. Please note that restroom passes will not be given the first or last 10 minutes of class so that students do not miss important instructions and closing activities.

### Preliminary Schedule of Topics, Readings, and Assignments

Our first semester includes being a historian and geographer before we move into the Native Texans Unit. We will Celebrate Freedom the week of September 16th . Age of Contact, Spanish Colonial, English Colonies/ Revolution, Texas Revolution, Independence and Early Statehood will be major areas of study before our December break. Students will be keeping an interactive journal and journals will be kept in the classroom. The students will participate in a warm up and exit ticket daily, these will go in the interactive notebook after I check over the work. Virtual learners will have a different set up, and will turn in their work virtually.

### Academic Integrity:
