Course Description:

Designed for students with grade level proficiency in language arts. Communication skills are reinforced as the student improves proficiency in sentence structure and learns the components of a well-developed paragraph through a process approach to writing. Grammar, spelling, vocabulary instruction, and research skills are emphasized.

Course Goals:

Students who complete this course successfully will be able to:

- Students will increase the volume of their reading
- Students will increase the complexity of their reading
- Students will develop an understanding of multiple genres
- Students will write about something they know, care a lot about, and write for real reasons

Student Evaluation:

Assignments, exams, expectations outside of the classroom:

Students will also assignments that are due in Canvas, so they will need to plan on having access technology.
