Course Description:

Students will learn the technology to create and manage professional-level video presentations. Pre-production planning (scriptwriting, storyboarding, shot preparation, and tools), production (cameras, lighting, sets, and direction) and post-production (editing, master creation and delivery) will be emphasized using short documentaries and exercises as the basis for mastery

Course Goals:

Students who complete this course successfully will be able to:

- capture audio and video using basic audio & video equipment
- edit video and audio files
- create a visual story based on a three-act structure
- export final project/video files to current industry standards & platforms

Student Evaluation:

The grading system for this course is as follows:

- Grade averaged 60% Major 40% Minor
- Major grades – tests (including District Common Assessments, projects, final essays, research papers, presentations); minimum three per six weeks

- Minor grades – quizzes, daily assignments, journals; minimum four per six weeks
- Each six weeks will count as 1/3 of the semester grade.
- A letter system (S, N, U) is used to report a student’s conduct based on proper/responsive conduct and citizenship
- Per Board Policy EIA (LOCAL), “The District shall permit a student who meets the criteria detailed in the grading guidelines a reasonable opportunity to redo an assignment or retake a test for which the student received a **failing** grade. This policy applies only to initial identified major grades and does not apply to daily assignments and quizzes. Upon reteach and retest, the new test, project, etc. recorded will be a high score of 70%.
- Official grades will be in Skyward only and can be accessed by student and parent through Family Access.
- **Assignments, exams, expectations outside of the classroom:**
Students will sometimes need to record audio/video clips for projects & assignments during class time and when they’re away from class (school) as well. The nature of any audio/video content acquired or viewed should adhere to the standards set forth in the EMS ISD Student Code of Conduct.
- From time to time, there will be opportunities outside of class time to engage in district events and scenarios that feature hands-on experiences using audio/video gear. Students are encouraged to take part in these extra opportunities but participation it is not mandatory.

Attendance/Tardy Policy/Make-Up Work:
